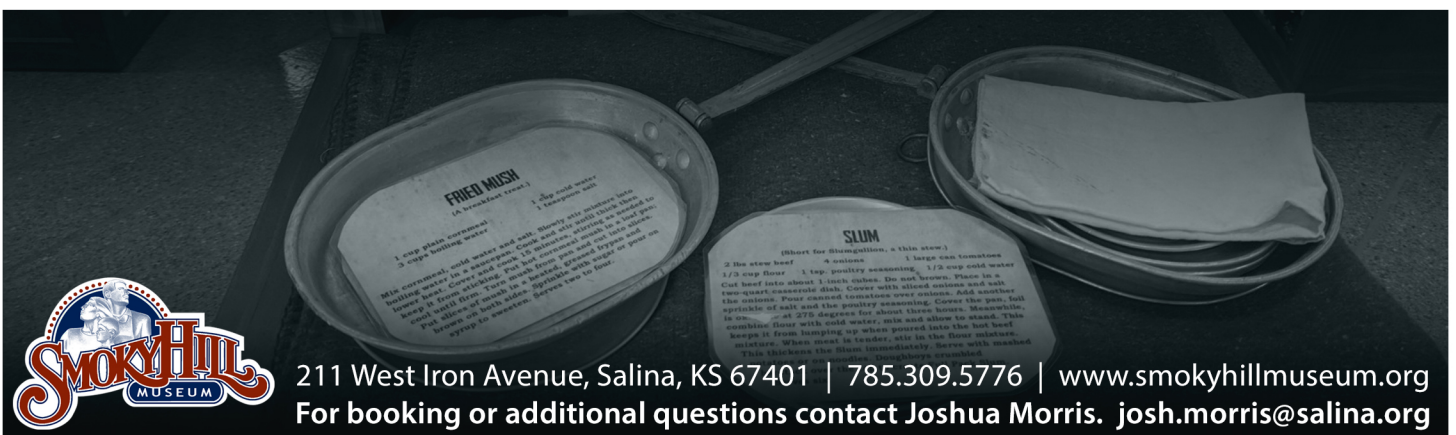
Explore the human face of WWI and the miserable nature of trench warfare. This unique exhibit focuses on first person accounts of Kansas soldiers and their harrowing accounts of life in the trench.

This mobile exhibit offered to you comes in a flexible arrangement that can be modified to meet your space requirements. Students, teachers and visitors will love the concise story that focuses on Kansas soldiers in the trenches of WWI. Best of all, the Smoky Hill Museum will take care of delivery, installation and training. When the exhibit is finished we will come and take care of removal. Included with this exhibit are three interactive elements and a packet of educational activities that can be utilized by staff and/or teachers to expand upon the topics covered.

## Exhibit Content:

- Trench Construction and Design – Soldiers ate, slept and fought in a maze of trenches.
- Life in the Trenches – The soldiers’ senses were bombarded with the noise of battle, the fog of smoke, and the smell of death and decay. Rations were, at times, sparse. Disease was a constant struggle living in mud, water and waste. Experience the fear of a gas attack with a gas mask challenge.
- First Accounts of Battle – With determination, and sometimes a little luck, soldiers fought heroic battles. Meet a few of the people involved in World War I through the interactive Vet Vignettes.
- Ending of the War – The sweetest sound was the silence, then cheering, when the cease-fire of Armistice was called.
- Returning to Normalcy – Soldiers faced new battles upon their return home, such as unemployment and PTSD.

Many soldiers were proud to enter WWI and fight for their country. Little did they realize the horrendous and life-altering conditions they would face. Some made it home, while others made the ultimate sacrifice. Those who came home would be changed forever. Some would talk about their experiences, others stayed silent. Some soldiers welcomed coming home to a new life, but others brought the war home with them.

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## QUICK FACTS

- +450 sq. ft. needed for exhibition.
- Electricity needed for 2 of the interactive elements.
- Standard booking period 1-3 months. Longer periods can be negotiated.

Users will be challenged to respond quickly and prepare themselves for a gas attack before it's too late.

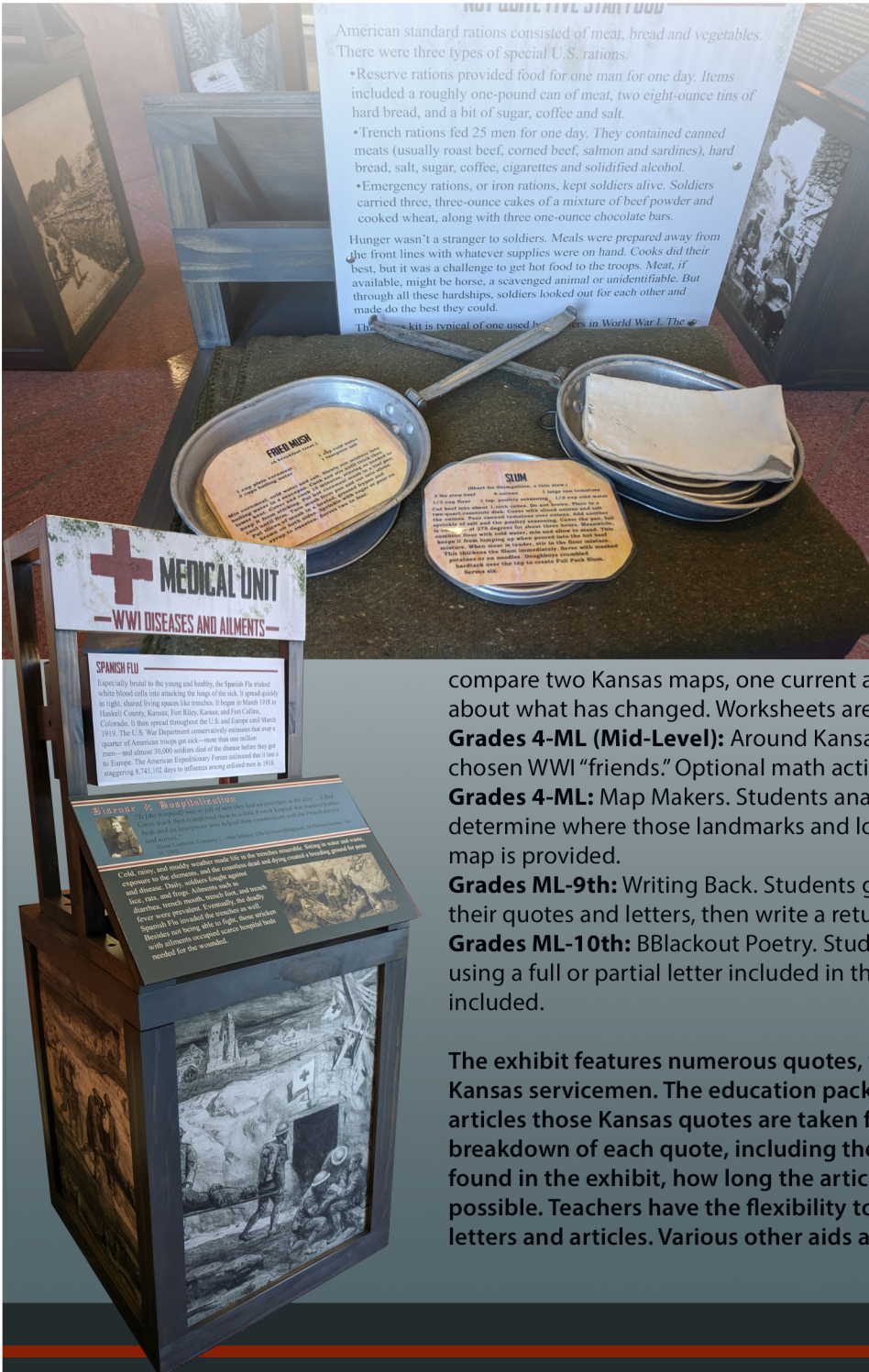
## NOT FIVE STAR FOOD

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## EDUCATION PACKET CONTENTS

### FIVE PUZZLES:

- WordSearch. Features words from the Not Quite Five Star Food section.
- Word Scramble. Focusing on the Medical Unit.
- Matching. Highlights the recipes from Not Quite Five Star Food.
- Dot to Dot. The finished picture is from the exhibit.
- Find the Difference Between Two Pictures.
- Packet includes answer sheets for each puzzle.

### FIVE LESSON PLANS:

- **Grades 2-4:** Then & Now. Students compare two Kansas maps, one current and one from 1933, to draw conclusions about what has changed. Worksheets are included.
- **Grades 4-ML (Mid-Level):** Around Kansas. Students create a map route to visit four chosen WWI "friends." Optional math activities and worksheets are provided.
- **Grades 4-ML:** Map Makers. Students analyze current landmarks and locations and determine where those landmarks and locations should be on a 1933 map. Large map is provided.
- **Grades ML-9th:** Writing Back. Students get to know the Kansas soldiers through their quotes and letters, then write a return letter to one Kansas soldier.
- **Grades ML-10th:** BBlackout Poetry. Students create a piece of blackout poetry using a full or partial letter included in the traveling exhibit. PowerPoint is included.

The exhibit features numerous quotes, the vast majority of which are from Kansas servicemen. The education packet includes the complete letters or articles those Kansas quotes are taken from. In addition, the packet offers a breakdown of each quote, including the soldier's hometown, where the quote is found in the exhibit, how long the article or letter is and a brief descriptor, if possible. Teachers have the flexibility to create additional lesson plans from the letters and articles. Various other aids are also included.
